#### Who fails?

- Increasing numbers across deanery including South East
- Those who sit it later
- Those who have already failed
- IMGs at greater risk especially in the past
- Those with undiagnosed dyslexia (more likely if from universities outside Western Europe)

### What is done badly?

- Statistics and data handling including drug dose calculations
- Devolved work asthma, diabetes, COPD, hypertension etc.
- Normal childhood development
- Vaccs and imms
- The photographs skin and eyes
- Medical emergencies
- GP administration
- Therapeutics
